As I look through the annual report, it's with great pride that I reflect upon the accomplishments of the dedicated and professional staff at Cornell Cooperative Extension Oneida County! CCE is a dynamic educational facility that partners with individuals, families, farmers, communities, businesses and industry to enable, empower and educate our fellow community members. We are committed to those we serve and to the role we play in building and sustaining strong and resilient economies and guiding sustainable development practices. Our program areas include:

In 2019, we continued our traditional programming and also worked on several new initiatives. Our annual Farm Fest was a huge success, with over 600 school children attending during the day and 5,000 community members in the evening. The CCE Herb & Flower Festival attracted over 1,200 people to the Parker Scripture Botanical Gardens and Child Care Council spring and fall conferences offered educational programming to over 190 attendees. We had over 800 students attend Ag Career Day and we held our second annual Taste of Central New York event, introducing over 400 people to local products that are made in and can be purchased in Central New York. We continue to build upon the success and momentum of the Mohawk Valley Farm to School movement, introducing local foods into area schools. In 2019, CCE took over the management of the Oneida County Public Market. We're excited to enter into this new venture and partner with Oneida County government to build upon the success of the market. We continue to work in conjunction with the Oneida County Executive and Oneida County Government to implement the Oneida County Dairy Farmer Sustainability Action Plan. Agriculture education is one of the action items within the plan and with the support of the County Executive and Board of Legislators we added an Agriculture in the Classroom educator to our staff to introduce Ag in our schools. We received a new parenting education grant that will give parents the education we all need to tackle parenting in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

These things represent only a fraction of the initiatives and programming offered by CCE. 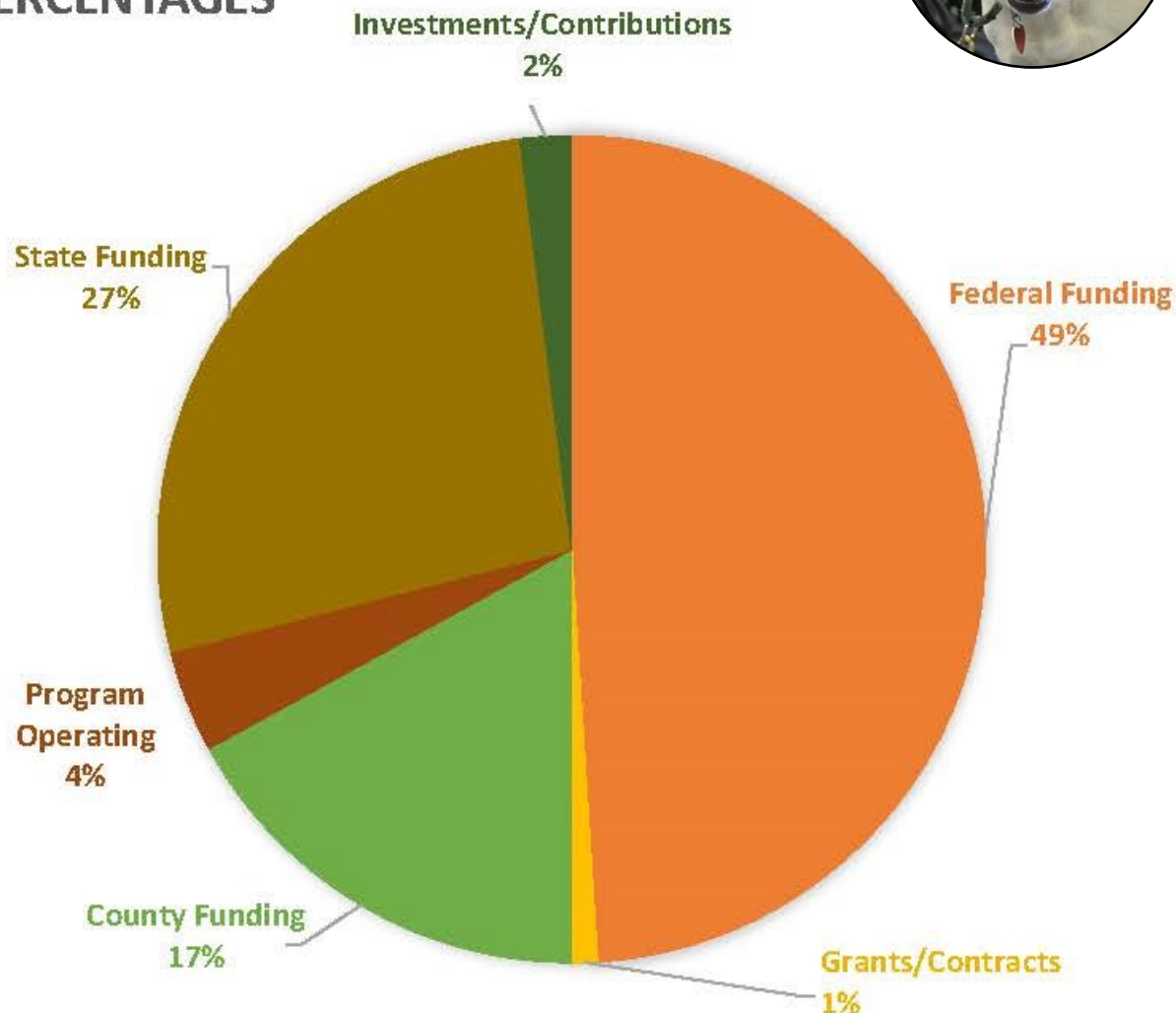

Oneida County 4-H is much more than just Clubs, Animals and the Fair.

In September, Conservation Ed Days, now in its 55<sup>th</sup> year, had 940 6th grade students spend the day at Delta Lake State Park visiting various hands-on educational stations that specialize in different environmental concerns or attributes of our unique eco-system here in upstate NY.

Throughout May and June the Parker Scripture Botanical Gardens became the destination of 1,389, K-3<sup>rd</sup> grade students. Field trip specialize in Honeybees, Three Sisters Gardening, Nature Walks and the Lost Ladybug Citizen Science Project.



# Oneida County 4-H



In May, 618 -4<sup>th</sup> and 5th Grade students spent a day on Brabant Farm during Farm Fest. Youth visited various stations where they learned everything from milking to plowing, corn to chickens, and horses to hay bales.



Creativity is alive and well in Oneida County 4-H through the Art in a Bucket Challenge. Made possible through donations of arts and crafts supplies from Joann Fabric and Crafts. Twenty 4-H Youth accepted the challenge to complete 6 different art projects for the County Fair. Some projects were explicit in what was expected, other projects, were free-spirited. All were designed to introduce participants to new concepts, mediums and different techniques. In total, 180 Art in a Bucket projects were shown at the Boonville Fair.



Oneida County 4-H and the Farm Bureau to bring agriculture into the elementary classrooms during Agriculture Literacy Week. ## Farmland Protection Plan

- Ag Economic Development (AED) and the Farmland Protection Board continue to work on the Priority Action Items uncovered by the Oneida County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Plan. These initiatives include supporting new farm and Ag-related business, connecting local farms with local consumers, bringing new individuals into agriculture careers through education initiatives and protecting farmland resources in our community.

## Agriculture Retention Visits

- AED works closely with staff from Mohawk Valley EDGE and the City of Utica to provide outreach to agriculture businesses to help ensure industry viability.

## Agriculture Incubator

- AED is partnered with MVCC and a strategic network of community stakeholders to design a Farm and Food Business Incubation program, which will broker resources to emerging agribusinesses, including entrepreneurial education programs and an incubator kitchen.

## Farm to School

NYSDAM Grant funded initiative to assist schools in procuring local foods for their school lunch program. Also for 2020, AED through a USDA F2S grant will be partnering with Madison-Oneida BOCES to develop a new curriculum that will allow FFA and other interested students to learn how to run a food processing business.

## Eat Smart New York (ESNY)

serves 10 counties across the North Country with SNAP obesity prevention education and activities.

### *The Oneida County program 2019 highlights include:*

- A total reach of 11,915 adults and children over the age of 5
- Tasteful Tuesdays at the Oneida County Office Building in Utica. The program included an education workshop with recipe demonstration and almost 100 pounds of garden produce given away to eligible constituents.
- The Coordinated Approach to Child Health (CATCH) had 338 youth participating in physical activities and health education at summer recreation programs in Oneida County.
- A total of 464 youth from 1 Utica and 1 Rome district elementary school completed the end of school year “Seed to Salad” nutrition education series.

657 parents/guardians called and received education and assistance with locating a child care program.



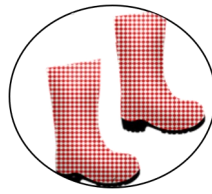
### 2019 highlights:

# Childhood Lead Poisoning Primary Prevention Program

The Childhood Lead Poisoning Primary Prevention Program at CCE is dedicated to eliminating lead poisoning as one of our region's most persistent public health threats. Through education, home assessments, and collaboration in a network of community partners, CLPPPP focuses on *fostering change* across those sectors most challenged by this environmental disease – healthcare, education, housing, government, and the local citizenry itself. During 2019, the CLPPPP team turned to some new education efforts.

On the local front, CLPPPP assisted Midtown Utica Community Center in enhancing its Urban Gardening Initiative. During their *regular* work in Utica, CLPPPP staff noticed an increasing number of vegetable gardens installed next to older homes, fences, and garages covered with peeling lead paint! This can be a source of lead poisoning for unknowing families. In response, CLPPPP hosted a “Get the Lead Out” workshop as a train-the-trainer event for 27 summer MUCC volunteers involved with urban gardening. The training and a neighborhood tour illustrated real-life hazards as well as safe garden teaching points.

On a larger scale, CLPPPP released its documentary, “Lead Poisoning... The Perfect Predator,” early in 2019. The film pulls together perspectives on lead poisoning from those most intimately involved with the issue – parents, teachers, landlords, health care workers, government leaders, and the victims themselves. “The Perfect Predator” was seen by audiences from coast to coast. and was selected by the American Public Health Association to be premiered at its national conference in November. 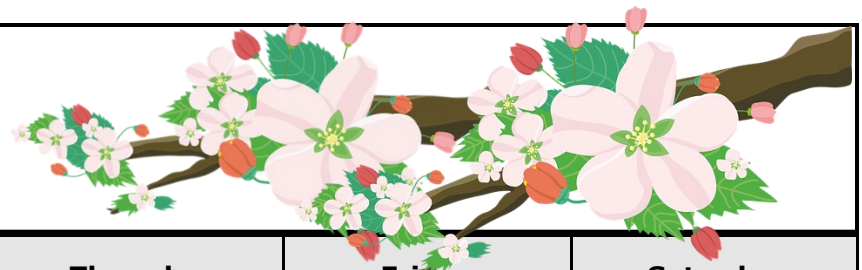

# Horticulture

Helping our community with resources and education

In 2019 staff and Master Gardener Volunteers (MGV's) provided:

- 76 In-house soil pH tests
- 395 responses to questions on the Horticulture Hotline
- 16 classes with a total of 370 in attendance
- MGV's also wrote 48 garden articles/tips published monthly in the Rome Sentinel and Utica OD papers and online .
- Gardening tips were also featured on Big FROG 104.7 radio
- All print and electronic media had a total potential reach of 9,392,782 individuals

## From Recipe to Market

In October CCE's Agriculture Economic Development team partnered with Mohawk Valley Community College (MVCC) at the Rome Campus for a 5-part workshop series for farmers and local aspiring food entrepreneurs. Participants tested their value-added food-based business concepts in professional kitchens lead by technical experts from across the field.

The curriculum included: Recipe Development & Preparation, Food & Kitchen Safety, Business Planning, Cost of Production, Marketing, and Distribution.

Participants can continue development of their value-added food production with our Ag Incubator Kitchen Manager at MVCC's Rome Campus, as well as, building consumer analysis during our *From Recipe to Market* tabling at the year-round Oneida County Public Market.

## Utica Somali Bantu Community Farming Project

Ag Extension Educators delivered support, education and resources to our next generation of farmers, the Utica Somali Bantu. Oneida Ag educators helped the group plan and build their agricultural resources while creating community inclusion and worked along side the Somali Bantu as they broke ground on their leased farmland in Westmoreland, NY.

Despite a late start in the season, families were eager to be assigned their plots and to be responsible for a piece of the communal farmland. The team was able to build education throughout the growing season focused on Northeast American geographical farming to support a new type of growing climate for the Somali Bantu community.

I grew up on a dairy farm in Oneida County attending Whitesboro High School and graduating from Morrisville State College in 2016 with a Bachelor's Degree in Agriculture Business Development.

After working for a large dairy cooperative for almost three years, I decided it was time to come home and share my knowledge and passion for agriculture with Oneida County's youth.

## What is Ag in the Classroom?

Oneida County and Cornell Cooperative Extension are excited to offer Agriculture (Ag) in the Classroom to their school districts.

Ag in the Classroom gives students the opportunity to explore a range of agriculture topics, as well as, the role agriculture plays in their daily lives, and career opportunities in those fields.

With only 13% of students in Oneida county having access to ag education, Ag in the Classroom helps students gain the knowledge, awareness, and appreciation for the industry that feeds them in their own local communities.

## Farm to School Success...

The Oneida Herkimer Madison BOCES\* food service warehouse has successfully aggregated and distributed over \$40,000 of NYS products in the fall of 2019 alone - this includes protein, dairy, fruits and vegetables. This indicates that our project to utilize the facility as a mini food hub has been a success!

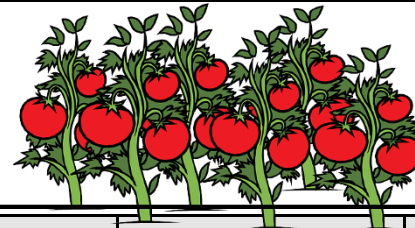
NYS products served so far this year include: milk, meatballs, hotdogs, pulled pork, cheddar cheese, pears, sweet corn, green beans, butternut squash, cauliflower, romanesco, potatoes, cabbage and apples.

# CCE Ag in 2019...

- Provided information to town meetings on rules and regulations that support local agriculture.
- Hired a county funded *Ag In The Classroom* educator to promote agriculture in schools
- Began an Ag Ambassador program to promote Ag careers to high school students
- Hosted a farm-employee training, educating owners and employees on F.A.R.M. program requirements.
- Worked with Aspiring & Beginning Farmers [USBFP] and Non-Farming Landowners [AFT Regional Navigator]
- CCE and the county established the *Oneida County Dairy Farmer Sustainability Action Plan* which:

- Improved sustainability of local dairy farmers
- Established a dairy steering committee
- Organized a meeting of local milk cooperatives
- Fast tracked Farmers DPW requests
- Offered a *Farm Safety Program Conference* at Clinton tractor

## Crops & Livestock:

Oneida County's main agricultural land use (2017 NYS Ag Statistics):

Corn	39,800 acres
Soybeans	9,300 acres
Wheat	2,200 acres

One major threat to crop yield and quality is weeds. CCE staff collaborated with Cornell research staff in NYS Integrated Pest Management. Weed seeds, suspected to be herbicide resistant, were collected and sent to Cornell. Trial results were reported at field events held at each trial location this summer. **Oneida County's largest herd type is dairy** with 16,500 cows and production of 43,183, 000 lbs. of milk (2017 NYS Ag. Statistics)

**Ag team keeps the local dairy industry informed on changing regulations through Farmers Assuring Responsible Management (F.A.R.M.) Program.** Participation is voluntary and animal care quality assurance is frequently updated.

## Eat Well Play Hard in Child Care Settings (EWPHCCS):

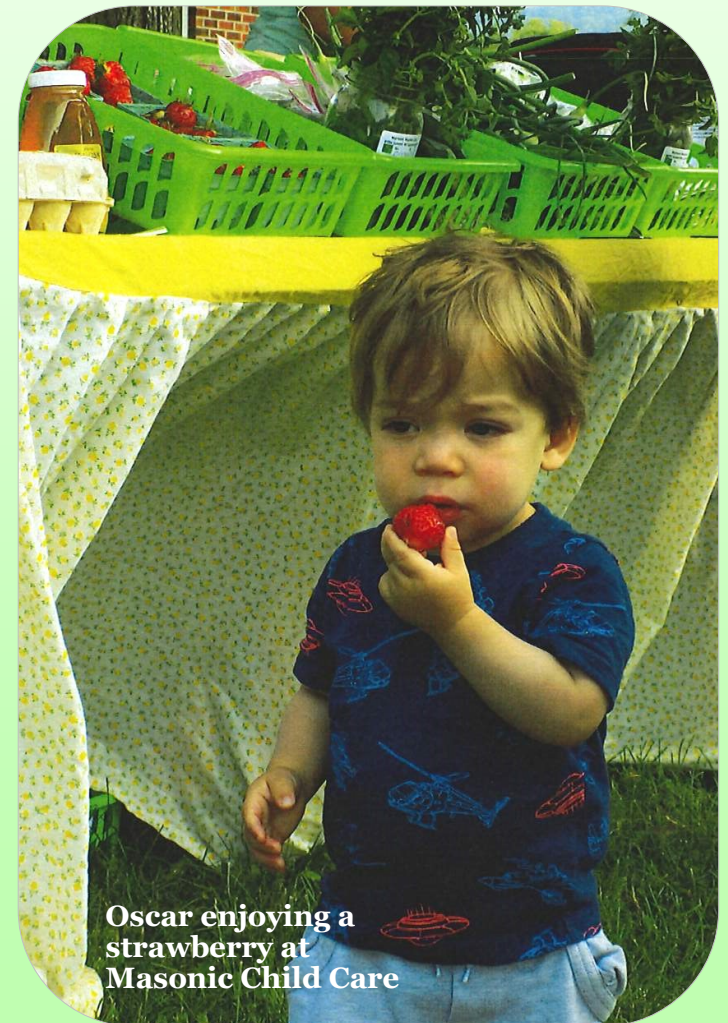
- An obesity prevention and nutrition education program that provides programming in income qualified day care centers in 8 counties.
- A 16 week educational program delivered by a Registered Dietician (RD), at qualified centers, provides training and workshops for staff, parents and children in pre-k classrooms. All workshops include a food demonstration and tasting.
- Upon completion the center is recognized as an EWPHCCS champion site. 2 champion sites are selected annually for an additional 12 week Farm 2 Preschool component also delivered by an RD.

### *The Oneida County program 2019 highlights include:*

- 7 Centers completing the program reaching a total of 288 youth, 98 staff and 118 parents.
- An annual advanced practice workshop at 4 Oneida County centers, where staff worked on sustaining program components and introduced Farm 2 Preschool activities into the centers everyday programming.

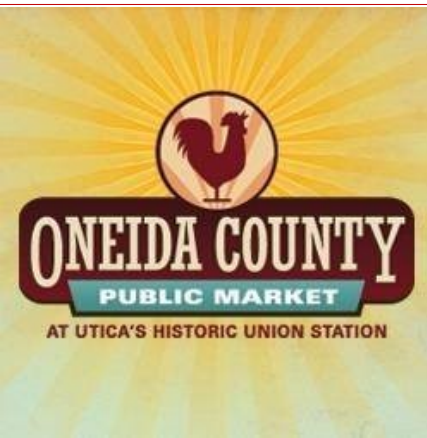

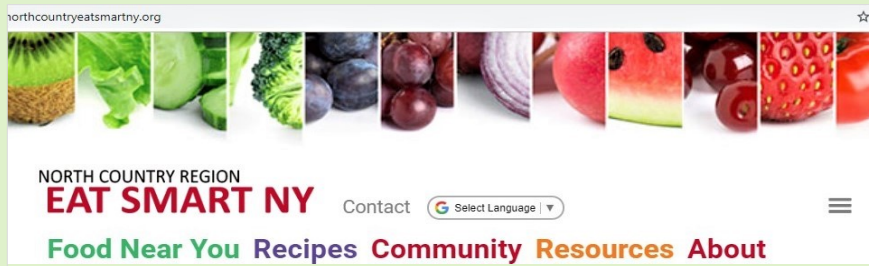

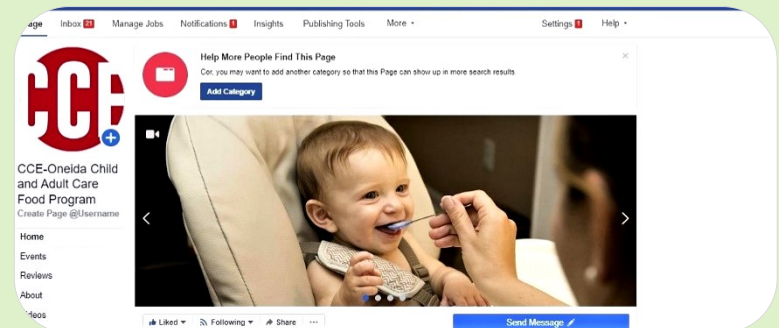
