At CCE Oneida County, we are all dedicated to empowering, encouraging, and equipping our community to cultivate a future of wellness, innovation, excitement, and growth.

As you look through the following pages, you will see examples of the many lives that CCE touches each year. We continually strive to meet the emerging needs of our constituents. 
This calendar features programmatic highlights from 2025, but it is impossible to share all that we do in just a few pages. CCE offers hundreds of programs each year reaching tens of thousands of participants. We use a variety of synchronous, asynchronous, and blended learning methods to deliver programming. We host in-person trainings, farm tours, classroom visits, zoom events, and record YouTube videos. At CCE Oneida County our goal is to make it convenient for people to participate in our programs and events. In 2026, we will continue to look for innovative ways to accommodate the needs of the community.

2025 has been an amazing year for CCE, but there have also been some challenges. Funding for SNAP education was eliminated. Nutrition education was a staple in our program repertoire, but in 2026 our staff of fifteen nutrition educators will become a staff of five. Although fewer in number, their commitment to bring nutrition education to the community remains steadfast. I am happy to report that we did see growth in other areas, and the other staff members were able to shift into new roles within CCE. We do recognize that there will always be challenges, but we will always be committed to continued growth and continued programmatic expansion. In the last 10 years, we have tripled in size and plan to keep going! As a result of this growth, in September, with the support of Oneida County, we broke ground on a \$7.2 million expansion project that will add 16,000 square feet to our building! This expansion enables us to continue to enhance our services to the community.

As 2025 comes to a close and we welcome 2026, I would once again like to thank our constituents, community partners, the Oneida County Executive, and the Oneida County Board of Legislators for their continued support. Finally, I have to thank the entire staff at Cornell Cooperative Extension Oneida County, our Board of Directors, and our wonderful volunteers for a job well done! Guided by a drive for service, compassion, and respect for one another and all members of society their dedication is unparalleled!

SNAP-Ed staff attended the Statewide SNAP-Ed NY Conference in May! Held in person for the first time in 5 years. Central Region staff joined a presentation and panel discussion on their new online learning platform Eat Easy

- Classes for Adults: A total of 162 inperson adult sessions reached 691 adult participants
- Classes for Youth: A total of 1,061 in-person youth sessions reached 4,983 individual participants (most participants were treated to a program series, which means they were visited approximately 6 times total in 2025)
- Retail and/or Farmer's Market Demonstrations: 20 Farmer's market demonstrations were provided, reaching 890 participants.
- New this year was participation in the Camden Farmers' Market (Oneida County), which began accepting SNAP/EBT.

CCE's SNAP-Ed Farm to Library:

Central Region SNAP-Ed NY continued supporting the Farm to Library program this year, a collaboration with local farms to collect donations of surplus produce that might otherwise go to waste and distribute it to community members through two local libraries: **Utica Public Library and Jervis Public Library**. The libraries also provide educational resources which include recipes, produce storage and preservation.

Through a partnership with the Oneida County Food Coalition, Cornell Cooperative Extension and the SNAP-Ed Nutrition program partner with ResQ2Feed Oneida County, a food recovery program that rescues surplus food from restaurants, grocers, schools, and other resources and then delivers the food directly to partner sites like nonprofits, pantries, meal sites, and housing.

Eat Easy Statewide Training:

- Central Region SNAP-Ed Staff Eli, Kristen & Leah developed and offered a 1.5-hour virtual training for all 12 SNAP-Ed regions across the state, reaching 187 participants.
- The training included an overview of the platform development and research, accessing the website and the resources available, example scenarios for educators to use with SNAP participants and community promotion resources.
- Eat Easy trainings for partner agencies were also provided to help promote the website to adult audiences with Utica DSS, Mohawk Valley Community Action Agency, Little Falls Library and the CCE Legally Exempt childcare program.







Eat Well, Play Hard in Child Care Centers (EWPHCCS) is a SNAP-Ed intervention

combining direct nutrition education and policy, systems, and environmental (PSE) change activities to support families in making choices to eat healthier and play more.

In Oneida County:

- The program engaged 4 childcare centers, reaching 131 preschoolers with fun and engaging nutrition education. EWPH also engaged 32 adults with parent nutrition resources and workshops.
- In addition to impactful nutrition education, the Eat Well, Play Hard program works with childcare centers to promote wellness through policy change.
- One of the participating programs, Thea Bowman House, is committed to improving the quality of life for all the families connected to their programs. The Eat Well, Play Hard program is dedicated to helping Thea Bowman and other centers in Oneida county, reach that goal.




















2026 Ag Literacy Week Book



Dog therapy can reduce stress, lower blood pressure, and help individuals experience overall emotional wellbeing.





In February of 2025, the Child Care Council of Cornell Cooperative Extension Oneida County hosted a regional launch of the Navigator Toolkit with 75 people in attendance, including New York Secretary of State Walter Mosley. This statewide initiative aims to provide support to businesses and employers affected by child care issues in their workforce.

According to Raising New York's 2022 analysis, 41% of N.Y. parents with children under 5 report child care problems affecting their ability to work, attend school, or manage other commitments.

Since the launch, **the Child Care Council has assisted 68 employers**, helping their employees and clients find and pay for child care.

An Oneida County Start-Up Grant has provided Oneida County with 21 new child care programs, offering 204 more openings for children.

This opportunity, initiated **by County Executive Anthony J. Picente Jr.**, has provided over
\$48,000 in its first year, creating 25 new jobs for child care providers and helping families work and learn in Oneida County.


